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### Alternate DCM Update August 2019 Jan S., Alternate DCM District 29, Panel 68

THE NEW AND TRIUMPHANT ARCH THROUGH WHICH WE PASS TO FREEDOM. Page 62, Big Book of alcoholics anonymous

As I was preparing to bring the theme for the workshop, it was suggested that I get a better understanding of what this phrase means to me. Of course, that meant I was going to read and meditate and pray about this, asking God for clarification.

On page 62 I read that the root of all my problems is my selfish, self-centered nature; and that I am being driven by 100 forms of fear, self-delusion, self-seeking and self-pity. In a word, self-will run riot although I don't realize it. Next comes the dire statement that I need to get rid of this selfishness or it will kill me. So, the message thus far, as I understand it, is that I need freedom from this way of living and thinking or I'm doomed. Reflecting on this now, I realize how confused and frightened that made me, but the very next sentence gave me the first suggestion of a solution to come...how to accomplish this seemingly impossible task...**God makes that possible**.

I remember balking just a little as I considered the bookshelf full of SELF-HELP books where I had been turning for the answers to the miserable way I was living. But each new idea proved to be another thing that I could not live up to and believe me I wanted to find a way out.

Going back to the basic text it tells me again that I cannot reduce my selfishness much by trying or by my own power and again it says that I need God's help. Now I'm beginning to be willing to ask HOW IT WORKS.

I go on to find the simple concept which is the keystone of the new and triumphant arch through which we pass to freedom...I must quit playing God. Realizing that like the actor described on page 61, I want to arrange the entire scene to suit me, and I'm running on self-propulsion, thinking that if everything goes my way, I'll be happy. Well that didn't turn out to be true for me. It only required an honest appraisal of my past to see that was so.

First, it was pointed out to me that the actor's job is to act not to direct. So, letting God be my director made sense. But being the word wonk that I am, I needed to understand what the message was talking about with God being the principle and me being the agent. I found this explanation in the dictionary ...the relationship between principle and agent is when one entity appoints another to act on his behalf; okay that's clearer now. "HE is the father and we are HIS children" is simple enough even for me to understand. A father teaches and directs his children out of love and concern for their welfare.

The last lovely part of this message is expressed in the promises found on page 63; when we sincerely took such a position, all sorts of remarkable things followed. We had a new employer. Being all powerful. He provided what we needed if we kept close to Him and performed His work well.

Now I become less interested in myself and my own little schemes and plans and more interested in what I can bring to life. Now I begin to find the peace and serenity I've been searching for. The most

wonderful insight I gained is how I used to think of God as being "up there somewhere" but now I am conscience of HIS presence right here, right now. And I began to lose my fear, and I am reborn. No greater freedom exists for me.

Thank you for letting me be a part of something so remarkable.

### Recovery in Sin City? To me a Miracle!

### The Inspiration of Recovery in V-A.A.-gas, baby!

Wow, I never would have expected! Such a great recovery experience in Sin City! I went to Las Vegas and found some amazing, spirit building recovery! I was so moved that I have decided to refer to the city as "V-A.A.-gas", baby!

A big shout out to the Serenity Club (<a href="https://www.serenityclublv.com/">https://www.serenityclublv.com/</a>) in Las Vegas! In writing this article I looked at their website for the first time and find it apropos that the main page says "Don't Be Afraid of Your Story... It Will Inspire Others!" I found during my Vegas trip that the inspiration mentioned in that quote is a two-way street, while my story inspires others so does the story of another inspire me!

The Serenity Club is home to just about every 12-step meeting type I can imagine. Each held at different times in one of the three meeting rooms. In addition to the meetings there is space for fellowship in the lounge and coffee bar! It was a pleasure to meet Saturday Night's Late-Night J and Sunday Morning's Sunshine while they were being of service slinging some seriously good mud and stimulating conversations! The majority of the meetings are those of A.A. groups. This place makes it hard to claim there is not a meeting at a convenient time with meetings going almost constantly from 5:30 a.m. to midnight! I attended three meetings while in Las Vegas, all at the Serenity Club and each brought a different set of inspirations.

As amazed as I am about the Serenity club, the most moving part of my "V-A.A.-gas" trip started before I was born for a punk rocker in the U.K. This bloke shined a light into my Recovery. We met at an A.A. Meeting 7:30 Saturday morning! I last saw him through joyful tears, my body covered with chill bumps, as we parted ways with a hug on Freemont street that night! What happened in-between is, to me, a compelling story of G-d putting us right were we need to be!

I had an opportunity to share, directly after a fellow receiving up a 1-month and a lady getting a 5-month chip. I told a 2-minute version of my trials and triumphs in sobriety. The bloke next to me broke into tears during my share. We chatted for a bit after the meeting until his taxi showed up. He explained that my story of walking through misery in sobriety inspired him in his belief that with the help of A.A. we could make it through anything sober. We shared our amazement that we came to be in the same meeting from thousands of miles away. Not to mention that we were in V-A.A.-gas where most people were passed out, "sleeping one off", at 7:30 on Saturday morning. We were from such different walks of life, born in different continents and yet drawn to that room together. We both found the same recovery and freedom in A.A. because we were inspired by a common misery! He headed off to play in a Punk Rock Band that night and meet with some former bandmates to make an amends. I was moved by his story and thought I would never see him again!

Later that evening as I walked out of the Fremont Casino into the sights and sounds of Fremont street, bam! I was catching my bearings and lo and behold here comes my new punk rocking, British friend from Philadelphia walking through the crowd! Straight toward me! I exclaimed to my traveling companion, oh my G-d! It's that bloke met this morning! As she

exclaimed who? She watched to big ol' fellas engage in a most welcoming hug in the middle of the crowd, as if longtime friends! I still am amazed at this chance meeting and the fact I could pick this bloke, whom I had only met 13 hours ago, out of a crowd (later that night I would walk past a friend I have known for 33 years several times while I was actively looking for him on that the same street). I believe the connection of sobriety and G-d's direction guided us together again for the second time that day! We shared for the next 10 minutes how we have experienced a new freedom and a new happiness through A.A.

He had made amends with his former band mates since this morning. He had last seen them – at the start of their success as a band – 9-years ago when he was in Vegas! He had made right his part of the damage from nearly a decade ago! He was now free from the burden of carrying his guilt about their last encounter.

We talked about seeing the look in folks' eyes, drunk and losing it all at the table – made us recognize the misery we had been in – willing to lose our whole life for the next drink! How we recognized the best we could do to help was to be in a seat in an A. A. room. Waiting and healing until they were ready to join us!


We expressed our gratitude to G-d for our meeting, for directing us to this place in the street! We prayed together for His strength to guide us and help us touch the lives of others who are suffering. Asked that He help us help them find their path to sobriety, so they could join us in freedom! I think, he too had tears in his eyes as we finished our prayer, parted ways and faded into the crowd! Thank you, G-d for bring this bloke into my life, thank you for giving us courage so we did not fear telling our stories. Our individual and not shared story inspires me!

Now to the locals I met along the way in "V-A.A.-gas", baby! Although our encounters were not as prolonged or geographically diverse, they are a part of the Miracle of Recovery I found in Sin City.

Midnight Chair spread the joy! Your story inspires me, don't be afraid to share your joy, it will inspire others! Thanks for making sure there is a midnight meeting and saving our feet the last half mile of walking at the end of a very long day – with over 10-miles of trekking in the city! I am glad G-d brought you to Vegas and let me see the joy and inspiration you bring to recovery!

CD your story is like music, I am glad to have met you and heard your no-nonsense view of how these 12-steps and the fellowship of this program go way beyond getting us away from the booze! Thank you for reminding me that the program offers me the freedom from my compulsion for MORE and my own self-delusion. Thank for inspiring me with your story about learning to live an honest life and being able to show up as exactly who G-d means me to be today!

Mr. XXX, your story inspired me to live by my principles. Meeting you and hearing a bit of your experience, strength and hope reminded me that I do not have necessarily understand the principles of others, I don't need to change their principles; I don't have to have anxiety when our principles are different. I learned from our encounter that to stay emotionally and spiritually fit I do have to live within my principles and find a way to make



peace with the world we share!

Ms. A, thank you for inspiring me to listen with a new heart to the routine readings! Teaching me to hang on every word and explore what the Big Book means to me and how it can help me learn to live without the wreckage of my past holding me back! It is true that rarely have we seen person fail but that thoroughly following our path takes some paying attention, a lot of work and is worth the effort!

Late-Night J thank you for inspiring me with your story! Keep coming back! I know we can do great things together, as we proved in finding that fancy desire chip for a special friend in Texas! It is indeed tougher out there than it is in here learning about ourselves and being honest about who we are! Oh, and it isn't so hard to share feelings when compared to the effects of holding them in! Keep going strong! Thanks for sharing our evening while being of service at the coffee bar.

Thank you, G-d for the Miracle of Recovery in Sin City! Thank you, Serenity club for a safe and inviting place to find the safe harbor of Recovery. Thank you, to my new V-A.A.-gas friends for not being afraid of your story... each of them has inspired me and I believe will inspire others! Thank you, A.A. for helping me be alive and awake enough to see V-A.A.-gas beautifully through sober eyes and with a joyful heart!

### An excerpt from Living Sober Chapter 5 – Getting Active

### A. Activity in and around A.A.

When experienced AA members say that they found "getting active" helpful in their recovery from alcoholism, they usually mean getting active in and around AA.

If you want to, you can do that even before you decide whether or not you want to become an AA member. You don't need anyone's permission or invitation.

In fact, before you make any decision about a drinking problem, it might be a good idea to spend some time around AA Don't worry— just sitting at, and observing, AA meetings does not make you an alcoholic or an AA member, any more than sitting in a hen house makes you a hen. You can try a sort of "dry run" or "dress rehearsal" of AA first, then decide about "joining."

The activities we often use at first in AA may seem fairly unimportant, but the results prove them valuable. We might call these things "ice breakers," because they make it easier to feel comfortable around people we do not know.

As most AA meetings end, you'll generally notice that some of those present start putting away the folding chairs, or emptying ashtrays, or carrying empty tea and coffee cups to the kitchen. Join in. You may be surprised at the effect on yourself of such seemingly little chores. You can help wash out the cups and coffeepot, put away the literature, and sweep the floor.

Helping out with these easy little physical tasks does not mean you become the group's janitor or custodian. Nothing of the sort. From years of doing it and seeing fellow members do it, we know that practically every person happily recovered in AA has taken his or her turn at the K.P. or refreshment-and-cleanup detail. The results we have felt from doing these tasks are concrete, beneficial, and usually surprising.

In fact, many of us began to feel comfortable around AA only when we began to help with these simple acts. And we were even more at ease, and much further away from drinking or the thought of it, when we accepted some small, but specific, regular responsibility—such as bringing the refreshments, helping to prepare and serve them, being a greeter on the hospitality committee, or performing other tasks that needed doing. Simply by watching other people, you'll learn what needs to be done to get ready for the AA meeting, and to straighten up afterwards.

No one has to do such things, of course. In AA, no one is ever required to do, or not do, anything. But these simple, menial chores and the commitment (only to ourselves) to do them faithfully have had unexpectedly good effects on many of us, and still do. They help give some muscle to our sobriety.

As you stay around an AA group, you'll observe other tasks that need undertaking. You'll hear the secretary make announcements and see the treasurer take charge of the contributions basket. Serving in one of those capacities, once you get a little accumulation of non-drinking time (about 90 days, in most groups), is a good way to fill some of the time we used to spend drinking. When these "jobs" interest you, leaf through a copy of the pamphlet "The AA Group." It explains what the group "officers" do, and how they are chosen.

In AA, no one is "above" or "below" anyone else. There are no classes or strata or hierarchies among the members. There are no formal officers with any governing power or authority whatsoever. AA is not an organization in the usual sense of that word. Instead, it is a fellowship of equals. Everybody calls everybody else by first name. AA's take turns doing the services needed for group meetings and other functions.

No particular professional skill or education is needed. Even if you have never been a joiner, or a chairman or secretary of anything, you may find—as most of us have—that within the AA group, these services are easy to do, and they do wonders for us. They build a sturdy backbone for our recovery.

### The AA Traditions and Concepts Series 2019

We are in the height of summer and August brings us to Tradition 8 and Concept VIII!! We are in the home stretch and nest month we have a new and different writer lined up. However, don't worry there is still time and a few more months that you can volunteer to write an article in this series!

### **Tradition 7:**

**Short form:** Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

**Long form:** Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever non-professional. We define professionalism as the occupation of counseling alcoholics for fees or hire. But we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we may otherwise have to engage nonalcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. But our usual A.A. "12th Step" work is never to be paid for.

I found freedom because the people helping me when I came to AA loved me in a way, I was not capable of loving myself at the time. I found I could believe and trust their love as genuine and sincere. I imagine that had I come to know someone was being paid to help pull me out of my misery, I would have not found it easy to believe as earnest. I can pass on that love and welcome others with my full heart. Not because I am being paid, but rather because I am being saved from returning to my own self-induced misery. For me, this Tradition is as simple as that.

### **Concept VI**

**Short form:** — The trustees are the principal planners and administrators of over-all policy and finance. They have custodial oversight of the separately incorporated and constantly active services, exercising this through their ability to elect all the directors of these entities.

**Long form:** The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finance, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities.

I must admit, I read and then re-read this concept... several times! In a slew of reading frenzy my brain interpreted blah, blah, blah... So, I realized I need help, some context and went to the internet! I also remember that this series was meant to help me, and others learn a bit more about World Service through a study of the Traditions and Concepts. So I went to a source I have used in the past to help me learn a little: The Twelve Concepts for World Service, How Bill W. explained the spiritual principles that undergird A.A.'s structure and how the parts work together which can be found at <a href="https://www.aa.org/assets/en\_US/p-8\_thetwelveconetps.pdf">https://www.aa.org/assets/en\_US/p-8\_thetwelveconetps.pdf</a>. Here Concept VII is explained as:

This Concept deals with the ways the General Service Board "discharges its heavy obligations," and its relationship with its two subsidiary corporations: A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. Long experience has proven that the board "must devote itself almost exclusively to the larger questions of policy, finance, group

relations and leadership .... In these matters, it must act with great care and skill to plan, manage and execute." The board, therefore, must not be distracted or burdened with the details or the endless questions which arise daily in the routine operation of the General Service Office or the publishing operations, including the Grapevine. "It must delegate its executive function" to its subsidiary, operating boards.

"Here, the board's attitude has to be that of custodial oversight .... The trustees are the guarantors of good management of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc .... by electing the directors of these service arms, a part of whom must always be trustees .... The executive direction of these functions is ... lodged in the ... service corporations themselves, rather than the General Service Board. Each corporate



service entity should possess its own bylaws, its own working capital, its own executives, its own employees, its own offices and equipment." Bill draws from earlier mistakes by the General Service Board in trying to run the service functions directly and warns repeatedly against "too much concentration of money and authority."

Thusly educated I think I can incorporate these thoughts into my daily life in at least two ways...

- 1. When I feel G-d has put something into my life, not worry about the details just show up and do my best.
- 2. When I delegate a task or ask someone to do something, leave the how to them!

Not to imply that the General Service Board is comparable to G-d nor I to the General Service board but to say that in most all aspects of my life I need to stay out of the way of either the details or the management. I can really only do one of the two well at a given time.
